


Race & Ethnicity Roundtable

What We Don't Know Can and Will Hurt Us

Summary: The Disinfo Dialogue: Race & Ethnicity Roundtable makes it clear that our online information ecosystem is currently set up for lies to win, people to lose, and corporations to profit. Bridget Todd hosts the expert-led conversation about the disproportionate impact of disinformation on women and communities of color. Guests include Jessica Ann Mitchell Aiwuyor, Founder of the National Black Cultural Information Trust; Liz Lebron, Founder & President of Blue Nexus Group; and Jaya Savita Aiyer, Director of the Asian Pacific Islanders Civic Action Network.

Bridget Todd is currently a fellow at Harvard University's Berkman Klein Center for Internet and Society. She is a frequently cited trainer and speaker on combating disinformation online. She is the creator and host of the critically acclaimed podcast *There Are No Girls on the Internet*, which earned a Shorty Award for "Best Podcast Miniseries" for DISINFORMED, a miniseries about racialized disinformation. She also hosts Mozilla Foundation's multi award winning podcast exploring ethics in AI.

Formerly, as Director of Communication for the national gender-justice advocacy organization Ultraviolet, Bridget regularly met with leadership from platforms like Reddit, Twitter, Facebook, and TikTok to advocate for and develop policy recommendations to make digital experiences safer and more inclusive.

With more than a decade of professional media experience, **Joshua Clark**, has been a storyteller all his life. After receiving his B.S. in Journalism from Boston University he pursued an M.F.A. from the University of Southern California and transitioned to producing film, television, and digital content. He's worked with The Oprah Winfrey Show, ABC News Chicago, Exposure Labs, and his short films have won awards at film festivals across the country.

"The legacy of disinformation is one of minority disenfranchisement, media manipulation, and democracy disruption, and its effects have only grown more insidious online," said Joshua Clark. "I directed this conversation to expose the harsh realities of disinformation for ethnic minorities, women and U.S. elections in hopes of finding ways to repair the societal fractures that continue to keep us apart rather than bring us together."
